Someone's son, daughter, husband, wife, cousin, best friend, grandma, grandpa, neighbor is out there suffering and they don't know there is a solution or are having a hard time getting to a meeting on their own. They need us.

John Barleycorn does not tire, and therefore needs no rest, is multi-lingual, multi-racial, multi-sexual, is exceptionally creative and is not stopped by transportation issues that make it difficult to get from one part of Brooklyn to the other. Essentially assuring us that we will always have something to do in Alcoholics Anonymous.

I look forward to even greater participation from groups around Brooklyn at our next county meeting Tuesday Nov. 2nd at St. Francis College on Remsen St.

Sharing my Thoughts on Share-A-Day

Like home groups have yearly anniversaries, so are other traditions born in AA. Brooklyn Share-A-Day (BSAD) is one of those remarkable events that give alcoholics and friends of AA the gifts of Recovery, Unity and Service. Last June 19, at Bishop Kearney High school in Bensonhurst – the location since its incarnation in 1980, Brooklyn County hosted the 31st Annual Brooklyn Share-A-Day.

Even though, on that same day, there were two AA retreats, another Share-A-Day and it was the first weekend in Summer 2010, over 300 people made a pilgrimage to Bensonhurst, Brooklyn and opened themselves up to the possibility of healing, compassion, joy, fellowship, introspection, acceptance, hope ... There was no where else in the universe I wanted to be except right there experiencing the energy and humanity of the commitment to our selves, to each other and to the program of Alcoholics Anonymous.

My first BSAD was in 2008. I went because I saw a flyer and was curious and what I got blew my mind and pried my consciousness open just a little bit more. I vividly recall the two meetings I attended – Step VII and Relationships in Sobriety and of course, the Keynote meeting – and today, whenever I run into those particular speakers, I think I might startle them a little with my still very strong gratitude and enthusiasm about what they gave me that day, my AA rock stars. They offered the hand of AA, I took it and the chain continued.

BSAD is filled with many many meetings running simultaneously (meetings were also available in Polish, Russian and Spanish as well as two American Sign Language interpreters on site), a Keynote speaker(s) meeting got everyone together in the auditorium and Informational Tables were available throughout the day for a person to learn more about the many service entities of AA. These included Brooklyn Archives, Young People in AA, Special Needs, Cooperation with the Professional Community, Public Information, Brooklyn and NY Intergroup, Al Anon and Spanish Al Anon, the Brooklyn Website Chair, Treatment and the Online Intergroup of AA(OIAA). OIAA introduced folks to and taught them how to go online and stay connected to AA, this service entity is especially useful for the home bound and those in isolated locations. Share-A-Days also provide opportunities to see AA films; the then newly finished Hope Video ran in loop throughout the day.

For this event, we are very fortunate to have the support of SENY translation services. Provided to us are the equipment and expertise for interpretation of up to a combination of three languages and hard of hearing. In addition to the usual translation needs, this year, two Delegates from Russia on route to the International Convention in San Antonio were brought to BSAD by the members of the Russian Group of Brooklyn. Without prior notice, we were able to accommodate and they were able to understand our two amazing keynote speakers, Jessamy and Paul McQ.

Since it's an all day event - doors opened at 8am and the last meeting ended at 5pm. - breakfast, lunch, snacks and beverages were provided throughout the day, free of charge. When we enter into a program of recovery we come to realize how imperative it is to take care of the body; it is in fact, one third of the body / mind / spirit triangle. People cannot concentrate well when they're hungry or thirsty. It was the planning committee's commitment this past year to recognize the importance of nutrition and hydration when inviting people to an all day event and according to the feedback and the generosity of groups, it became clear this idea was important to the majority of Brooklyn AA members as well.

Spanish District

My Name is Eddie D. and I am a member of a new group of Alcoholics Anonymous. Our group, *El Lenguaje Del Corazon*, or Language of the Heart, is a Spanish speaking meeting that meets every Wednesday night at 7pm, on 186 Saint Johns Place and 7th Avenue. In September we celebrated our one year anniversary and we are grateful to have the opportunity to carry the message of recovery in the Park Slope area.

The last twelve months have been a great learning experience for our small group of members. Among the most important work that we have done has been the effort of trying to visit other Spanish groups in Brooklyn, other boroughs, as well as groups in Westchester and Long Island and inviting them to come and support us. Just as important has been the work of establishing relationships with the different organized service offices in the area. Currently we have a group member representing us at the Spanish Brooklyn Intergroup and our GSR represents us at the Spanish District 414.

The service at the Spanish district 414 has been s most rewarding as well as a most challenging one. One of our first surprises, when we started to attend the meeting, was to learn that they meet on a weekly basis for a period of two hours. Every Saturday afternoon, GSRs, as well as some Alternate GSRs, make their way to a church basement located in the Bushwick area of Brooklyn. The meetings are divided into planning, business, and study of the 12 Traditions and the Twelve Concepts of World Service.


Most of the fifteen Spanish groups located in Brooklyn are represented and those without a GSR are visited by a committee or invited to attend the four annual workshops that are organized by the district. As part of one of these committees, our group had the opportunity to visit all the groups in Brooklyn and be part of a workshop dedicated to provide information about the importance of having a GSR. All groups were represented at the workshop that took place on August 28, at the location of the group *Una Solucion* or One Solution. Three excellent speakers shared their experience in doing service at the group level, outside the group and the critical role that a GSR has in linking the group with the rest of AA. The event was well attended and a great success.

It has been truly amazing to witness the commitment and gratitude of all members of the District 414. In addition to Brooklyn events, members are invited to speak at meetings in all other boroughs and Long Island. All this hard work would soon be rewarded as they have been selected to host the 2011 New York State Spanish Convention. As Spanish groups continue to grow in Brooklyn with the support of their district, we hope to become involved in AA events of all different languages.
