#### Willingness

As an untreated alcoholic, I had an amazing amount of willingness to find the next drink so I could continue my escape from reality and responsibility. I set aside all other priorities in favor of that one self-destructive goal, and the costs were high.

When I came to the program, I learned that I had to turn it over, set aside the drinking so I could face the reality and responsibilities I had so long avoided. By admitting my problems, using faith and the fellowship to support me when I felt I couldn't go on anymore, I found the willingness to become something different, new. To be the human being I had always dreamed I could be, that everyone expected me to be.

I had to set aside my selfish, childish notions and look to the simple satisfactions of sobriety, serenity and the sense of security that comes from knowing that my painful past can be someone else's life preserver. To be willing to have my defects of character removed, I had to see the good in going down the road less traveled, taking things one step at at time, knowing I will never be alone as I trudge the road of happy destiny.

#### Cooperation, not Affiliation

Every day I am given the opportunity to walk the delicate line between working with others to share a solution for alcoholism, and becoming embroiled in other people's priorities. My path to recovery starts with, and must go no further than, sharing my experience, strength and hope so that I may stay sober and that someone else may hear the message of hope, of recovery from this disease.

As a volunteer serving in A.A.'s general service structure, I need to maintain a clear sense of our primary purpose when interacting with addiction treatment and other medical facilities, correctional institutions and other centers of detention, and all the various commercial businesses I interact with in the commission of my service.

To cross or blur the lines of cooperation and affiliation is to jeopardize all that eighty years worth of one alcoholic talking to another has done for the still suffering people afflicted with this disease. It could result in A.A. winding up as the Washingtonians and the Oxford Group did, a mere footnote in history. Too many have sacrificed much, and so many more still waiting stand to gain from this program.

By keeping it simple, we allow the miracles to happen, and let outside enterprises to function in their own way, without tying us in a bind. It works, it really does.

#### Safety In the Rooms Questionnaire

Brooklyn County voted to develop a pamphlet, called *Safety In the Rooms*, to address concerns about safety within the fellowship of Brooklyn AA. Toward that end, a questionnaire has been posted on www.brooklynaa.org, and distributed to the District Committee Chairs (DCMs) seeking input from all Brooklyn AA groups about their experiences where the issue of safety came into play.

For those of you who aren't able to access an online copy of the questionnaire, here is that questionnaire below. Please bring this questionnaire to your group's next business meeting and if the group has experienced any of these safety issues we would love to know what happened, how the group handled it, and how well that solution worked.

- A) Illegal Activity Illegal activity includes any criminal or illegal acts, including but not limited to selling drugs in a meeting, selling illegal DVDs, etc.
  - A.1 What happened (brief summary)?
  - A.2 What did the group do?
  - A.3 What was the outcome?
  - A.4 Other suggestions on the topic.

These questions will also apply to the next three topics (B, C and D).

- B) Disruptive or Disorderly Conduct *Intimidating or threatening behavior that disrupts the meeting.*
- C) Bullying, Harassment or Discrimination Including verbal abuse, sexual harassment, bullying by exclusion, discrimination of any kind, etc.
- D) "13th stepping" Inappropriate behavior toward vulnerable members, including but not limited to newcomers.
- E) Newcomer Safety Suggestions: What steps does your group take to ensure the safety of newcomers when they're in the rooms or at fellowship?



Example: make sure newcomers going to fellowship are with a group.

F) Group Policy Suggestions - Does your group have any standing policies or procedures to address issues of safety in the rooms (can be any of the topics mentioned above or any other safety-related topic).

Example: our group's secretary announcements includes that the chairperson has the responsibility to ask anyone who's being disruptive to leave the meeting.
